- (a) Select one, and one only, of the following exercises, and execute it in any medium you consider suitable.
- (b) The same number of marks is allowed for each exercise.
- (c) The purpose of this examination is to test the ability of the candidates to arrange the general scheme and masses of a pictorial composition.

1. Draw a design, in colour, for a panel 14 inches wide by 9 inches high, of a row of figures, against a plain background, in any concerted movement or action, *e.g.*, Children going to or leaving School; A First Communion Procession; A File of Scouts; A Party of Hikers.
2. Draw to scale, in colour, a design for a School Picture, to be printed in simple masses of colour without an added outline, on a sheet 30 inches wide by 20 inches high. Any subject that would be interesting and instructive to children may be depicted.
3. Draw, to half scale, a design in black and one other colour, for a cover for a special number of an Irish newspaper. The design is to be printed on white, and reproduced by photo process. The size of the cover is to be 21 inches by 15 inches. The subject may be derived from history, industry, or country life.
4. Make a drawing in pen-and-ink of a single figure engaged in any strenuous game or exercise, in a panel 9 inches square for reproduction by line block to 6 inches square.
5. Draw a design, in colour, full size, for a Show Card, size 14 inches by 10 inches, to advertise any household article or commodity, *e.g.* Soap; Boot-Polish; Sugar; Brushes.
